New Hampshire thrives when state funding fairly supports local communities. Therefore, the residents of Hudson are asked:




Do we call on the New Hampshire Legislature to protect local taxpayers by ensuring adequate state revenues for essential services, and by avoiding policies that shift costs onto local property taxpayers?

This question arises because recent state budgets have reduced or eliminated key revenue sources, forcing towns and counties to raise property taxes to maintain education, healthcare, county nursing homes, public safety, and infrastructure. These shifts burden working families, strain local budgets, limit flexibility, and undermine long-term community prosperity.

A state budget that prevents cost-shifting and restores municipal revenue sharing eases the tax burden on local property taxpayers and strengthens communities.

Be it further resolved that the Select Board/Town Council shall send the results of this vote to the Governor and all members of the General Court representing Hudson within 30 days.
