COVID-19 State of Emergency Mask Usage by Town Committees

Scope

In light of the data produced by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) that shows evidence of widespread community transmission of the COVID-19 illness, the Town of Hudson is implementing the use of masks in all Town Facilities and by all Town of Hudson Committee members.

Purpose

The CDC recommends that people wear a cloth face covering, at minimum, to cover their nose and mouth while in the community setting. There is evidence that people continue to spread the virus while being asymptomatic. Wearing a mask will aid in preventing the inadvertent spread of the virus. This does not relieve the social distancing requirement but does add another layer of protection.

Definitions

- **Fabric Masks**
 - A three layer mask that includes elastic loops or ties
 - Constructed of three layers of fabric
 - Washable and reusable
 - A single layer gator style mask does not meet this requirement
- **Surgical Mask**
 - Mask is meant to help block large-particle droplets, splashes, sprays, or splatter that may contain germs (viruses and bacteria), keeping it from reaching your mouth and nose. Surgical masks may also help reduce exposure of your saliva and respiratory secretions to others.
 - Importantly they need to fit to the face. The metal nosepiece should be gently pinched over the nose. Glasses should go over the mask to prevent fogging. Wide wing openings on the cheeks do not allow the intended seal and protection. They should be kept in a paper bag (i.e. lunch bag) and not on a car seat, dashboard, or gearshift.
 - Mask should be considered a single use device

Procedure

1. The Town will Supply masks / coverings that are to be worn while you are at your committee meeting. These may include procedure masks, cloth masks or an alternative depending on supply.
2. It is the responsibility of the committee chair to make sure this guidance document is followed.
3. It will be the responsibility of the member to maintain their mask in a good state of repair.
4. The following should be used for cleaning the masks:

Cloth face coverings – Can be laundered in a washing machine with your regular laundry or hand washed separately.

Procedure Masks – Should be disposed of and not cleaned in any way. They should be disposed of properly when no longer serviceable.

5. Individuals should be careful not to touch their eyes, nose and mouth when removing their face covering. You should wash / sanitize your hands immediately after removing your mask.
6. Masks / coverings should be used in all public settings to include during committee meetings.
7. Ensure your mask fits snugly against the side of your face and allows for breathing without restriction.
8. Committee members unable to wear a mask will not be allowed to attend meetings in person but will be allowed to participate by remote access.

Use of Cloth Face Coverings to Help Slow the Spread of COVID-19

How to Wear Cloth Face Coverings

Cloth face coverings should—

- fit snugly but comfortably against the side of the face
- be secured with ties or ear loops
- include multiple layers of fabric
- allow for breathing without restriction
- be able to be laundered and machine dried without damage or change to shape

CDC on Homemade Cloth Face Coverings

CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies), **especially** in areas of significant community-based transmission.

CDC also advises the use of simple cloth face coverings to slow the spread of the virus and help people who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others. Cloth face coverings fashioned from household items or made at home from common materials at low cost can be used as an additional, voluntary public health measure.

Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the cloth face covering without assistance.

The cloth face coverings recommended are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators. Those are critical supplies that must continue to be reserved for healthcare workers and other medical first responders, as recommended by current CDC guidance.

Should cloth face coverings be washed or otherwise cleaned regularly? How regularly?

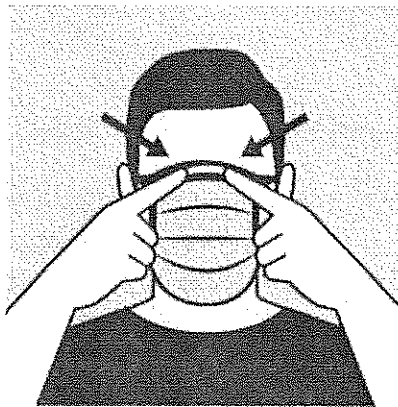
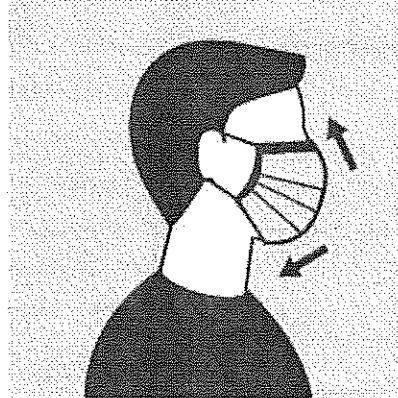
Yes. They should be routinely washed depending on the frequency of use.

How does one safely sterilize/clean a cloth face covering?

A washing machine should suffice in properly washing a cloth face covering.

How does one safely remove a used cloth face covering?

Individuals should be careful not to touch their eyes, nose, and mouth when removing their cloth face covering and wash hands immediately after removing.
