CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING

Bustling as always, especially during April vacation. We offered only a few extra programs during April vacation because we were short staffed between professional development

opportunities and staff vacations. Marissa really stepped up while Tanya was away at a conference and ran her own programs plus Tanya's. We've heard nothing but positive feedback about programming. Wildlife Encounters was a big hit as always. We were blessed to have the weather cooperate for an outdoor event in April. Our regular program numbers have stayed fairly steady in spite of warmer weather.

The Friends of the Library have been very generous. They donated a storytime rug that we used for storytimes and school visits. They also donated water tables and money toward our storywalk and summer challenge prizes. We are so blessed to have so much support from this group!

Tanya applied and was selected to attend the New England Library Leadership Symposium (NELLS): Mid-Career Leadership Program. She was also awarded a scholarship based on her hard work, dedication to library services, and demonstrated leadership. The conference was held at the Von Trapp Family Lodge in Stowe, Vermont. Twenty-four libraries were selected from 70+ applications. They spent the week learning about project management, diversity, equity, inclusion, building successful teams, communication, advocacy, and other leadership skills. Tanya's biggest takeaway was learning the importance of crafting an appropriate mission and vision and how to use it to prevent scope creep. Every time we have a new great idea, we need to ask "does this fit our mission?" If it does, then we ask "if we say yes to this, what do we have to say no to?" Another important takeaway was learning to communicate by thinking about what behavior you want BEFORE crafting your message.

We are taking a break from regular programming for the month of May. We do have a farm storytime planned for May 9th at Alvirne Farm. Suzanne Roark is excited to be working with us again. She and her students will show off the calves and give a tour of the working farm to families after a songs and stories with Ms. Tanya. We have also planned a few collaborative art projects that we will use to decorate the library for our "All Together Now" summer reading theme. Tanya and Marissa will spend May 22-June 9th visiting schools. We were invited to visit each class (K-5th) during their library time to read a story, create art to decorate the children's room, and promote summer events and resources at the library.







⇒Analysis: There is a marked decrease in all areas of searching interaction. This is due to Google changing its search criteria; before February 2023 Google counted each individual impression (i.e., visit/search/interaction), regardless of whether or not they were conducted by one user or several users. Google now counts multiple visits/searches/interactions, etc. by one user as one impression. So, if a user visited our website multiple times in one day, these are counted as one impression.

Business Profile Searches




Views show how many people saw our Business Profile on Google Search or Maps. Views are up +0.6% from this time last year.

MUSEUMS

We had a significant increase during the last week of the month since it was school vacation week. The NE Aquarium tends to be checked out nearly every day during these weeks. It didn't get as many checkouts as Zoo NE this time (13 vs. 16 checkouts.) Overall, there were 93 reservations and 69 checkouts, a good increase since March. 24 were not checked out, however. It would be interesting to know how much weather may have been a factor.

A patron had tried to pick up a pass early, stating the policy didn't say that he couldn't do so. Vicky and Mark updated verbiage on the website and MuseumKey to reflect this.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Rodger That! - Google Analytics shows 97 users for an average viewing duration of about 12 seconds, 101 sessions. No significant additions to content.

YouTube - We have 69 subscribers, same as last month. There were 533 views total, watch time 7.8 hours.

Facebook - Total followers were 1,646. Very slight fluctuations. There were 27 posts. The post with the most Engagement at 171 was the first picture of the Duane King Memorial Expo.

Twitter - We lost three followers in April, current total of 574 followers. This number is holding fairly steady. 301 Profile Visits. 16 tweets total. The top tweet with 57 impressions was picture of the Duane King Memorial Expo.

Instagram - 260 followers. 12 posts in April. 214 accounts were reached, 56 engaged.

<u>GENEALOGY</u> - The event was in-person for "Strategies and Hints for Researching Your French-Canadian Ancestors" by Gerry Savard. 11 people attended. At this point, higher attendance is occurring more virtually. It's nice to have people in the building, but in-person doesn't draw the crowd it once did since COVID.
