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Hudson Library Board of Trustees Approved Public Meeting Minutes For August 20, 2025

Call to Order: Trustee Bohrer called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and led the pledge of allegiance.

Public Input: Sue Gould and Jan Walsh from The Friends of Hudson Library spoke at the Trustees' meeting thanking them for all the years of support and the use of the Hudson Memorial Library Building. They also requested the possibility of one more book sale in October, 2025 that would coincide with the open house at the Hudson Fire Station.

Reports:

Motion by Trustee Guessferd to accept the Public Minutes of June 18, 2025. Seconded by Trustee Rafieymehr. All in favor. Motion passed.

Motion by Trustee St. Onge to accept the Sealed Non-Public Minutes of June 18, 2025. Seconded by Trustee Weber. All in favor. Motion passed.

Motion by Trustee Bohrer to unseal the Non-Public Minutes of June 18, 2025. Seconded by Trustee Guessferd. All in favor. Motion passed.

Correspondence: The Trustees received a thank you note from staff in appreciation of merit awards given to staff.

Treasurer's Report: We received our appropriation check which has been deposited. Checks have been written and all finances are in order. Fiscal year 24/25 was closed and all outstanding bills have been paid. There were no issues with closing out the fiscal year.

Acceptance of Donations:

Selectman Liaison's Report: On behalf of the Board of Selectman, you did a great job at National Night Out. What a great time. It means a lot to the community.

Director Pilla informed the Board that she would like to offer Angie the position in IT. She is going back to library school and would make a great addition to the staff. September 9, 2025 is the proposed start date.

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Staff Update:

Our Youth Services Library Page, Ron Votour, is scheduled to head off to college at the end of August. Ron has been an outstanding Page - we will be sorry to see him go. I have created a job listing. We have currently received 6 applications. Tanya and I will meet during the week of July 14 to discuss interviews with qualified applicants.

GMILCS/Library Updates:

GMILCS has scheduled a system update (7.8) for July 24. Among other improvements and fixes, this update will allow us to more efficiently integrate the new texting software we need following the changes to our current texting services. Polaris LEAP will likely be down for most of the day on July 24 as the update is installed and then tested. Patrons will need to have their library card with them in order to check out books.

The HVAC unit that cools the Children's Room has been repaired. It first broke down about three weeks ago. We contacted United Services, and a technician arrived before 8 AM the following morning. The technician noted that there was no error code in the system. He reset the system and made a slight adjustment to the programming. Unfortunately, without an error code, they couldn't determine the exact cause of the problem. During this time, the unit has functioned for most of the duration, and we managed by resetting it when necessary and using fans to assist with cooling.

On July 8, the original technician returned, diagnosed the issue, drove to Manchester, NH, to collect a new part to replace the original, which was still under partial warranty, installed the new part, and tested the unit. We are still going strong.

Staff Update:

We have recently hired two new library pages to replace Ron Votour, who is leaving to go to college. As of the writing of this report (08/15/2025), I am happy to report that, pending the final approval of the Board of Trustees, we have found our new Head of Information Technology Technical Services(IT/TS). Angela "Angie" Hurshman will is scheduled to start on September 9, 2025. Vicky Sandin, our previous Head of IT/TS, has agreed to continue part-time until Angie is fully trained.

GMILCS/Library Updates:

GMILCS new texting service - Message Bee will go active on Monday, August 18. This service will improve our ability to efficiently communicate with our patrons and staff. Message Bee will allow communication from "the library," not from our personal cell phones.

The HVAC unit that cools the Children's Room has been repaired. It first broke down around June 15. We contacted United Services, and a technician arrived before 8 AM the following morning. The technician noted that there was no error code in the system. He reset the system and made a slight adjustment to the programming. Unfortunately, without an error code, they couldn't determine the exact cause of the problem. During this time, the unit has functioned for most of the duration, and we managed by resetting it when necessary and using fans to assist with cooling.

Following several more instances where the unit refused to work, the original technician returned (July 8), diagnosed the issue, drove to Manchester, NH, to collect a new part to replace the original, which was still under partial warranty, installed the new part, and tested the unit. We are still going strong.

Hills Memorial Library Update:

August 12, 2025 Almost a year to the day since Hills ML was flooded, a similar event occurred. The major difference this year is that the building no longer has carpet, furniture or plywood flooring in the basement. The water poured down the ramp, forced its way around the basement door and made its way into the basement area. Bob was able to clear the water using a wet-vac and reported no damage. The drying off continued until Friday and no further action need be taken.


