Trustee Comments:

Trustee St. Onge: I'm in the library at least once a week so I use everything. First of all, I would like to say thank you to Sensory Seekers. We now have a pass and I have applied for it and I'm picking it up tomorrow. We all like to read and I just want to say that if you've never joined a book club before, we have so many different opportunities. This summer I tried to go to a few more that I hadn't gone to before. Some are in the morning, afternoons and even evenings. There is even one that's held at a restaurant. I recommend joining or checking them out. I attended a talk by a young man who came from a college that did some research on the history of profanity. That was very interesting. We have so many different and wide ranging things that I just can't imagine that there isn't something that somebody couldn't find to enjoy and it's free. The hours at the library are wonderful. Remember that November is banned book month. I'm having fun challenging people on what books they have read and why do they think they are banned.

Trustee Guessferd: I just want to thank the staff for working so well all the time and doing all the things they do to make it so free and available. I love reading the reports every month about all that is going on at the library.

Trustee Rahieymehr: I love when I go to the library and spend time with my grandson. The smiles that all the staff have are great. They are all there to help everybody. CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING

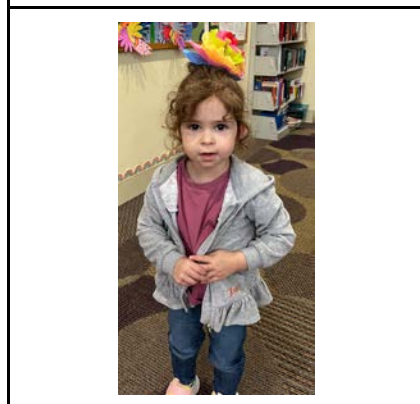

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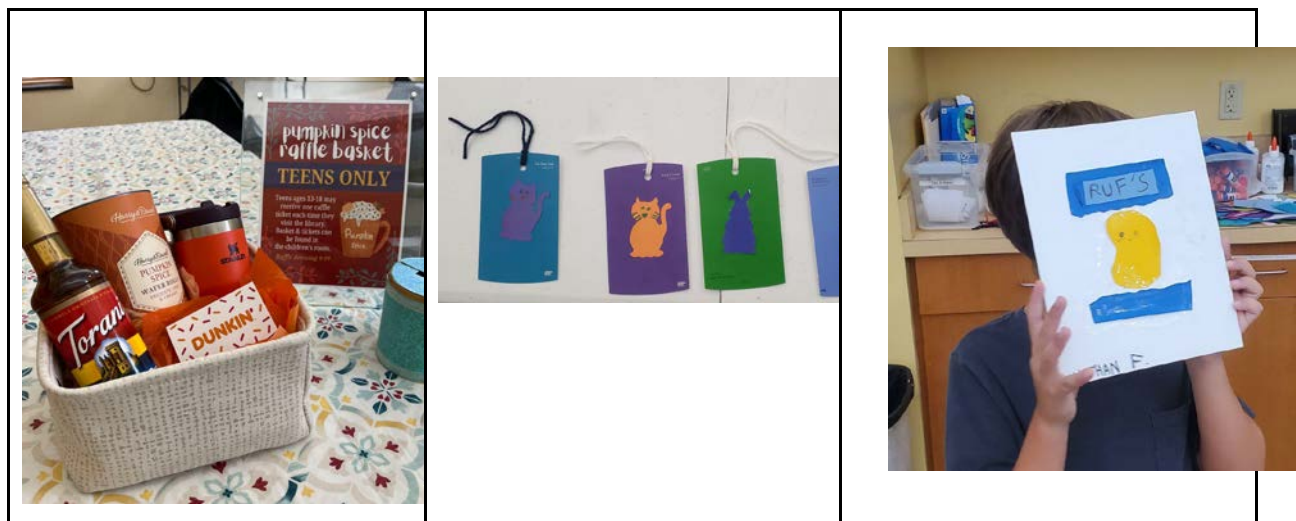


TEEN/TWEEN PROGRAMMING

Other

The refurbished replacement 3D printers arrived. One has been set up and is working. The other is not functioning properly. Mark contacted Makerbot, who shipped another replacement printer. Makerbot is also switching to a new platform for online printing called Ultimaker Digital Factory; the old platform looks like it will be phased out at the end of October. Mark and Krista have tested and used the new platform and have been able to use it to print wirelessly on at least one printer.

Mark began sending the welcome email to new cardholders every week. This involves him pulling the applications from the "Patron apps to be checked" folder from Circ and emailing those patrons a copy of the welcome email.

Mark ran three programs in September: Managing Your Email (10 people), Computers Made Easy (10 people), and Name That Tune: 80s Edition (6 people).

Mark also took a proactive approach to filling in his knowledge gaps in Circulation. He helped with one GMICLS shipment and is looking for more opportunities to practice, offering to step in when he sees such an opportunity such as signing up new cardholders.
