I have lived in Hudson for 27 years and raised my children through the public school system. While our town is not without its weaknesses, it is a vibrant community in a great location that offers a nice mixture of rural neighborhoods, small businesses and plenty of parks and recreation. The two visions that I would like to see for our future would be the high school renovations, as they are long overdue and needed, and a solution to the high traffic volume on Lowell Road. To that end, I would not be opposed to the smaller (single lane) version of the Hudson Boulevard project, especially if it had an adjacent bike path. If there's one thing that makes us lose our "small town" feel, it's the bumper-to-bumper traffic on Lowell Road, or having commuters fly down the residential Wason Road which was not meant to be a bypass. All of our surrounding towns use Hudson as a connection to Route 3, to Nashua, or to Massachusetts. We know our neighbors and kids play in the street. The TR Zone is just as historical as this rural character we hear about. The benefits of the TR Zone (close proximity to services, natural gas, city sewer and water) are not available to most of Hudson. Another great benefit to all of Hudson is the garbage pickup. Nice, neat looking containers and regular pickup. Not the case in all communities. I think future development should follow the model of the TR Zone of houses closer together with the addition of each development reserving land for recreation and walkable services. Complete streets design with space for walkers, bicyclists and cars would be a welcome relief from the mostly car only street design of today.

I live here to be in a small-town vibe. If I wanted to live in a city with houses on top of each other I would have moved to a city. Having more large homes means more families with children. The middle school has always been over crowded and understaffed without the proper programs for children that need extra help. Those children are just pushed into high school and are lost. Many of those kids drop out of school because they are frustrated with classes and cannot move forward. I have a friend who is moving right before her child gets into middle school because of the issues they had with their two older children getting the appropriate help with school. They do not want their youngest to have the same issues. My own son had issues as well and instead of getting help, one of his teachers made him look like a fool in class. When he was to be promoted to HS the classes the teachers recommended for him would have caused him to fail. I tried to get him assistance in middle school without success, but before he started HS I intervened and met with his counselor to be sure he was in the right classes. Luckily they were extremely helpful and able to put him in classes and a program to help him meet his goals and get better grades than he ever had previously. Cut back on building new homes, focus on the schools that need help and help the small businesses get off the ground and not hold them back.
