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NEW CONSERVATION LAND



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By 1892 the triangular tract of land we know of as "Library Park" was surrounded by several residences. George Sanders had his fine Victorian home on the corner of Derry Street and Highland Avenue.

Across the way on Sanders (now Library) Street, he also had a tenement building known as 'the block'. Along Ferry Street were a row of 9 single family homes built and owned by his brother, James. Along Highland Street hill and along Derry Road were other fine homes. Development in this area was greatly aided by the supply of water from the standpipe owned by George Sanders on Highland Street hill.

Above photo: 1892 Map of Residential Area Around Triangular Tract

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
Other signs of progress in the "Bridge Area" should be noted. The iron bridge was no longer adequate for the increased electric car (trolley) traffic across the bridge. Plans were being made for a new concrete bridge, one adequate for expanded trolley traffic as well as motorized vehicles.

A new 4 room schoolhouse, Kimball Webster School, was in use on Sanders Street. Also, the very first library building, Hills Memorial Library, had recently been completed at no cost to the Town of Hudson, a gift to the town from the family of Dr. Hills. Hence Sanders Street was changed to Library Street.

There was no development on this triangle of 54,787 feet (about 1.25 acres); but the owner, George Sanders, later had plotted it into 9 or 10 small building lots, although none were sold. Mr. Sanders had lumber mills and wood product factories in this area. To meet payroll and recover from business losses, much of his property, including this tract, was mortgaged. The mortgage was defaulted on, and Caldwell Buttrick of Nashua became the owner. He later sold to George Fisher and Charles Clement of Nashua. By 1909 they recorded Plan 201-1 with the Registry of Deeds showing division into 12 building lots. Yes, this 1.25 acres (54,787 square feet) tract was available for sale by its owners. Let's look at how Library Park came to be!

For several years prior this tract was under discussion by residents as a possible public park. Not far from the north angle of this land, near Highland Avenue, there had been an ancient cellar; that of Nathaniel Davis who settled there as early as 1755. Two of these lots (#3 and #7) were sold and construction started on lot 3.

In response to these developments, the local inhabitants realized development of this land would not be a lasting benefit for the town. Interest in a public park lingered but no action was taken to make it happen. By March 1911 there was a warrant article before the town meeting to see if the town would vote to acquire this parcel and raise money for the purchase. The article was indefinitely postponed. Later a subscription was circulated and signed by quite a few people who pledged a considerable sum of money for this tract. Meanwhile construction on lot 3 was proceeding quite rapidly.

A special town meeting was called on May 15, 1911 to see if the town would authorize the selectmen to acquire the land by right of eminent domain for a public park. At this meeting Dr. Alfred K. Hills, who had always favored the acquisition of this land for a public park, submitted a resolution. This resolution authorized the selectmen to acquire, by condemnation or other method, grade the piece for the purpose of a public park to be known as Library Park, provided there be no expense to the town. The board was also authorized to appoint a commission to lay out the park and a superintendent to care for it, also at no expense to the town. This resolution passed unanimously. Dr. Hills would bear all the expenses for the purchase of the land and for grading the park with the financial assistance of Mrs. Mary Creutzburg.

Mary Creutzburg was the mother of Ida Virginia (Creutzburg) Hills, the second wife of Dr Hills. Mrs. Hills had passed and was laid to rest within The Alvirne Memorial Chapel on Derry Road. This chapel was consecrated in November 1909. Dr. Hills married Jesse Norwell of Nashua in April 1910. Following the passing of Ida Virginia, Mary Creutzburg continued to live with Dr. and Mrs. Hills, spending much time in their Summer Home, Alvirne, now referred to as the "Hills House" on Derry Road. Mrs. Creutzburg considered Hudson as her residence.

I have not been able to locate any documentation for this special meeting but there is definite evidence that the resolution was carried out! The land was procured from the existing owners by the town of Hudson. Dr. Hills and Mrs. Creutzburg donated money for this purchase and as needed for the grading and improvements to the surrounding roadways. The owner of the lot on which a house was erected was compensated with a larger lot nearby. A cellar was built, and the house moved onto it. This expense was paid from the funds raised by subscription.

By the end of June 1911 work was underway to convert this tract of land into a public park under the able direction of V.W. Payne, foreman for Dr. Hills. With the use of up to 13 men and 2 dump carts, the lot was cleared of trees and stumps and leveled. The house which was "in process" was moved and the cellar hole filled in. BY mid-October, at the corner nearest the bridge, a stone was placed. On this stone was a bronze marker identifying this as Library Park and the donor as Mary Field Creutzburg. In the northeast corner a covered seat was placed as a resting place for those waiting for the trolley.

BUDGET \$EASON

The Town of Hudson operates on a fiscal year beginning July 1 and ending June 30 of each year. On Friday, October 6, 2023, the department heads of Town Hall will begin presenting their Fiscal Year 2025 (FY25) budgets to the Board of Selectmen. These presentations are the beginning of what is commonly known as "budget season." This first step is just the beginning of our budget adoption process, which will include a line by line review of each department by the Board of Selectmen before handing it over the Budget Committee for their review.

Once the proposed budget for FY25 is presented to the Budget Committee, they will begin the process of creating the final budget, holding a Public Hearing on the budget, and, ultimately, presenting a final budget to the voters at the Deliberative Session.

We encourage all residents to engage in the budget process, as the investments being made in our community will impact many aspects of daily life in both the short and long term. It is also very important for voters to understand the process of how a budget vs. a default budget works.



Conservation Land Purchased

Hudson Conservation Commission members are pleased to announce that another 43 acres of prime forested land have been added to the town inventory of Conserved Land around the southern end of Robinson Pond. The Transfer of Ownership of this beautiful parcel located at 13 Tiger Road took place in early September and is now open to the public to hike and enjoy!

This newly acquired parcel ties in with the Berrigan Property which was purchased by the HCC a few years back on the southerly side of Robinson Pond Drive for the purpose of protecting a very important watershed from future development. Ease of access to

the property can be made from the Hazelwood/Tiger Road connection. Drive to the top of Tiger Road and the parcel will be on your left. Additionally, there are no current plans to develop hiking trails at this time so please be careful while exploring!

A land purchase such as this does not happen without the concerted efforts of a great group of people at Town Hall. We on the commission would like to thank the Current BOS, our Town Liaisons Elvis Dhima, Don Kirkland and Doreena Stickney and our Town Administrator Steve Malizia for supporting and helping us finalizing the deal.



A RECIPE FROM TOWN HALL BACON-WRAPPED BLACK COD

with Spinach and Capers

 12 strips of thick cut bacon

Four 6-ounce black

minced 5 cups baby spinach

- cod filets2 tbsp. unsalted butter
- 1 leek, thinly sliced •
- 2 garlic cloves,
- 2 tbsp. capers Zest and juice of 1 lemon
- Kosher salt and ground pepper

- Preheat oven to 375 F and line a baking sheet with aluminum foil.
- Arrange bacon slices on the baking sheet in an even layer and bacon begins to brown but still soft, set aside and let cool.
- Heat a large skillet over medium heat. Meanwhile, season fillets with salt and pepper then wrap each fillet with 3 pieces of bacon securing ends with toothpicks.
- Reduce heat to medium and cook fillets until bacon has browned, flipping fish as needed.
- Transfer to clean plate and tent fish with foil.
- Add butter to the pan and melt. Then, add leek and garlic, sautéing until fragrant.
- Add spinach, lemon zest and juice, salt and pepper and cook until spinach has wilted.
- Serve the bacon-wrapped cod over spinach, garnishing with capers.
